2021-2022 CLUB SERVICE

- The Public Relations Committee kept the club's Facebook page and website up to date with current information including photos of weekly meeting speakers. A bio and photo of every new member was published on the club website.
- Southeast participated, along with the other Springfield Rotary clubs and the Rotaract club, in a All-City Rotary meeting on May 11th. The speaker was Clifton Taulbert.

2021–2022 COMMUNITY SERVICE

- The Basketball Tournament Committee raised \$13,380.85 for Special Olympics.
- Southeast Rotary held a blood drive in September, 31 donors participated. There were a total of 62 donors that participated in the Rotary city-wide Blood Drive held in January. Forty four of those donors were from Southeast Rotary.
- The Community Grants Committee awarded \$10,000 to the following organizations and projects:
 - Big Brothers Big Sisters \$1,000
 - Diaper Bank of the Ozarks \$1,000
 - Discovery Center of Springfield \$1,000
 - Drew Lewis Foundation \$1,000
 - FosterAdopt Connect \$1,000
 - History Museum of the Ozarks \$1,000
 - Mercy Health Foundation \$1,000
 - The Kitchen (Rare Breed) \$1,000
 - The Victim Center \$1,000
 - Uijma Language & Literacy \$1,000
- A grant project totaling \$26,129.01 was completed in partnership with Springfield-Greene County Park Board and The Rotary Club of Springfield North providing improvements to Miracle Field. This project was made possible by a Southeast Rotary donation of \$7,558.97, Rotary North donation of \$1,231.11, Parks donation of \$9,978.03, and a District Simplified Grant totalling funds \$7,360.
- The Hands-On Projects Committee organized a volunteer effort for 5-7 members to serve at the Fairbanks monthly by preparing and serving dinner for families participating in the Northwest Project. This project was able to resume in March 2022 after a hiatius due to Covid.

- The annual Lend-A-Hand award was presented to Jeff Cumley in June, 2022.
- The Rotary Outdoor Activity Movement conducted 8 challenges throught the year to promote physical activity to members and the community.
- Southeast Rotary partnered with other Springfield Rotary Clubs and The Rotary Club of Delacias Mexico to provide band instruments for a high school in the state of Chihyahua, Mexico. Funds totalling\$2,496.11 were raised to refurbish and ship 22 instruments for high school students.
- Southeast Rotary contributed \$409 to The Fairbanks for school supplies for under-resourced children.
- A donation of food was made to Harmony House valued at \$530.

2021-2022 INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

- The Rotary Foundation Committee conducted a Rotary Foundation Program in November 2021 explaining the history, goals, and achievements of the Rotary Foundation.
- 143 Southeast members (76,5%) gave \$44,719.61 to the Rotary Foundation, including \$4,170 to PolioPlus and \$7,500 to a Global Grant water project. We have 139 (74.3%) EREY members.
- Total all-time giving to the Rotary Foundation is over \$1,192,055. The average gift in 2021-2022 was \$157 per member versus the district average of \$205.
- The PolioPlus Committee conducted a weekly raffle to benefit the PolioPlus Fund of the Rotary Foundation. Total contributions were \$1,392 from the raffle.
- Southeast Rotary lead a city-wide Peace Pole project, resulting in the dedication of the first of five planned peace poles in K-Park in June, 2022.

2021-2022 NEW GENERATIONS

- The Interact Committee continued to advise and support the Interact Clubs at Glendale and Parkview High Schools.
- The Rotaract Committee, continued to have a close relationship with the Springfield Rotaract Club. Rotaract members attended Southeast meetings and our members attended their meetings at times as well.

- The Student Guests Committee hosted senior student guests from all of the local high schools at an offsite meeting at Miracle Field to recognize their efforts.
- The club sponsored 4 students to attend the Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA) in the summer of 2022.

2021–2022 PRESIDENT-ELECT AVENUE

- The Fellowship Activities Committee conducted 5 socials during the year at Billiards, Millwood Golf & Rachuet Club, MSU Bears Football game, Springfield Cardinals game, Vantage Rooftop Lounge and Conservatory, and Vineyard Market. The committee also planned the annual Holiday Party which was held at Char Steakhouse and Oyster Bar and the annual Float Trip.
- The New Member Orientation Committee conducted two New Member Orientations for new members in the fall and spring.
- Monthly new member luncheons were hosted at Big Whiskeys throughout the year by the Welcoming Committee.
- The Membership Development Committee shepherded 12 prospective members through the new member process this year.
- The Programs Committee insured quality programs for the weekly meetings, including a special Veterans Day program and Veteran recognition.

2021-2022 VOCATIONAL SERVICE

- The Directory Committee updated and published the membership directory.
- The Fellowship Luncheon Committee held two rounds of fellowship luncheons. In October, members had the option to visit 417 Magazine, Maxon Fine Jewelry, Mid-West Family Marketing, Prime Club (JQH), Springfield Public Schools and VIB Hotel. In April, members had the option to visit Breast Cancer Foundation of the Ozarks, Child Advocacy Center, Dynamic Strides Therapy, Green County Judicial Center and Victory Mission.
- The Vocational Awareness Committee presented the annual Vocational Service Awards in June to one local police, fire, and sherrif's department empolyee in recognition of their outstanding service to the community.
- The Volunteer of the Year award was presented in June to Judy Bilyeu.

ROTARY CLUB OF SPRINGFIELD SOUTHEAST ENDOWMENT, INC.

- The Rotary Club of Springfield Southeast Endowment, Inc. was established in 2015 as an independent 501(c)(3) to raise and disburse funds for issues of poverty, children, child abuse, housing, hunger, health, hygiene, education, and safety, plus the six areas of Rotary service in Springfield and the surrounding community.
- In 2017, the Founders Club was established for The Rotary Club of Springfield Southeast Endowment, Inc. Fifty-six Rotarians and the Rotary Club of Springfield Southeast contributed \$1,000 each to this fundraising campaign.
- The Sam and June Hamra Heritage Society was established for planned giving with a planned giving contribution from Sam and June Hamra of \$100,000 made to the Southeast Endowment.
- The Southeast Endowment has conducted an annual golf tournament and for the last four years has had a raffle for a luxury vacation.
- The Southeast Endowment has raised approximately \$175,000 to date.
- The Southeast Endowment has recieved commitments of over \$225,000 in planned giving gifts.
- In 2022, the Southeast Endowment Board kicked off the Give Greater 100 campaign, raising \$17,500 to date.

Rotary is dedicated to seven areas of focus to build international relationships, improve lives, and create a better world to support our peace efforts and end polio forever.

PROMOTING PEACE

Rotary encourages conversations to foster understanding within and across cultures. We train adults and young leaders to prevent and mediate conflict and help refugees who have fled dangerous areas.

FIGHTING DISEASE

We educate and equip communities to stop the spread of life-threatening diseases like polio, HIV/AIDS, and malaria. We improve and expand access to low-cost and free health care in developing areas.

PROVIDING CLEAN WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE

We support local solutions to bring clean water, sanitation, and hygiene to more people every day. We don't just build wells and walk away. We share our expertise with community leaders and educators to make sure our projects succeed long-term.

SAVING MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

Nearly 6 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. We expand access to quality care, so mothers and their children can live and grow stronger.

SUPPORTING EDUCATION

More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy.

GROWING LOCAL ECONOMIES

We carry out service projects that enhance economic and community development and create opportunities for decent and productive work for young and old. We also strengthen local entrepreneurs and community leaders, particularly women, in impoverished communities.
